1. A strong local economy

I'll work with our Council to ensure we have the sound financial footing—balanced with fiscal responsibility—that meets the needs and expectations of our citizens—including infrastructure, parks, and public safety—now and into the future.

A healthy and productive work environment is essential to any organization, and I'm committed to ensuring our city staff have the support of the Mayor's Office to provide our citizens with exceptional service. I value a positive attitude and a can-do spirit—something I see every day in City Hall. As mayor, my job is to ensure these services are provided efficiently and effectively, but it's our staff who do the job. I'll do my best to ensure their long tradition of excellence continues.

- As chair, facilitated public hearings

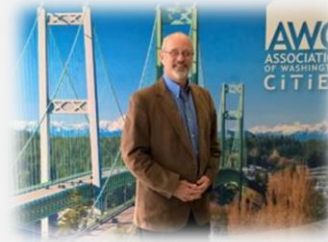
Other community involvement
